“Yes sir! No sir!, the two dozen teenagers dressed in regulation gray clothing responded. Such was the verbal style and dress code for participants in the Burlington County Sheriff’s Department Youth Development Camp. No archery or swimming, only Respect & Growth.

‘These young people referred to the court system because they’ve had a minor run-in with the law. They’re selected for this program because they’re hopefully willing to accept some personal challenges’ says Burlington County Sheriff Jean Stanfield, whose office has run the program for the past seven years.

We’ve had 504 graduates so far, and the results have been very gratifying. Stanfield notes that when kids receive intervention after low-level offenses, their chances for straightening out are high. ‘These are generally good kids,’ she says, ‘who have made bad choices.’

Boys and girls in the two-week sessions, which run every summer, and during certain school vacations, spend their days at camp, but go back to their homes at night. Parents or guardians must provide transportation both ways. Infractions of the rules lead to dismissal from the camp. From 8am to 4pm, the teens not only experience many demanding physical challenges, including daily calisthenics and military-style drills, they also hear motivational speakers, tour the nearby Burlington County Jail, and most of all, have experiences that drive home positive messages about values, integrity, trust and self-knowledge.
