Welcome

Encompassing 115 acres, Long Bridge Park welcomes Thousands of people visit Long Bridge Park each year visitors to a forested sanctuary along the Rancocas Creek. With upland and lowland forests, a freshwater pond and wetlands, tidal marshland, creek shoreline, and meadows, visitors can enjoy hiking, biking, fishing and picnicking in a rustic natural setting along the Rancocas Creek. A playground with two ageappropriate play areas and several picnic pavilions are also available in a beautifully landscaped central trailhead area.

Facilities & Activities

Long Bridge Park is open to the public 8 AM to dusk. Park facilities currently available include:

- Hiking/biking trails
- Playground with age-appropriate play areas
- Picnic areas with reservable pavilions
- Wildlife observation blinds

Trail Use

Long Bridge Park features 2.5 miles of marked trails traversing a variety of terrain. Please stay on the trails. Park trails are designated for shared use by hikers and all-terrain bikers. All-terrain bikes must yield to hikers, and bikers must dismount at boardwalk crossings and stairs. Cross-country skiing and snowshoeing are also welcome when trails are snowcovered. Equestrian use is not permitted.

History

to enjoy its picturesque landscape, well-maintained trails, and playground area with pavilions where families and children gather and play. However, many do not realize how the park ultimately got its name.

Originally, the land located at the fork of the Rancocas Creek belonged to the Lenni-Lenape Indians. They chose this location because the fertile land permitted subsistence farming, the woods provided game, and the creek offered fishing and a transportation route for Long Bridge Park is a wonderful place to observe trading. They called this area Sandhickney. In future years, this area would be known by several different names, including Long Bridge.

> The area was known as Long Bridge because of the long wooden toll bridge that crossed the south branch of the Rancocas Creek on the road that led from Mount Holly to Moorestown. In 1778 during the Revolutionary War, local American patriots partially dismantled this bridge to delay the British march across New Jersey after Commander-in-chief of the British Army Sir Henry Clinton and his men evacuated Philadelphia. Clinton's secretary recorded the incident in this manner: "At a small distance from . . . [Mt. Holly a bridge was broken down by the rebels which, when our people were repairing, were fired upon by those villains from a house, two of which were taken prisoners, three killed and the other two ran into the cellar and fastened it so we were obliged to burn the house and consume them in it."

> In the 1840s, a bricklayer and mason named Barclay Haines ran his steamboat downstream from Haines's port to Philadelphia and back delivering lumber and coal. In 1847, Haines purchased 50 acres of land and created a small settlement near the Long Bridge over the Rancocas. By early 1852, this community had generally become known, and remains today, as Hainesport.

Park Rules

- 1. The park is open from 8 AM to dusk. Dusk is defined as one-half hour after the posted sunset time.
- 2. Please stay on the trails. Hiking and riding off the trails are not permitted.
- Use of alcohol and tobacco are not permitted.
- 4. Charcoal fires are permitted in permanent grills provided at designated picnic areas only. No wood fires.
- 5. Dogs must be on leashes at all times. Please carry out your dog's waste.
- 6. Please pick up your own trash and a little extra, if you can!
- 7. Do not feed or approach wildlife Enjoy from a distance.
- We recommend you wear insect repellent and light-colored clothes with your pant legs tucked into your socks or boots. Always check yourself for ticks after hiking.
- 9. Please do not pick vegetation.
- 10. All-terrain bikes **MUST** use designated trails only and MUST give right-of-way to hikers. Follow trail markers.
- 11. No motorized dirt bikes or all-terrain vehicles allowed.
- 12. Boats are not permitted in the pond.
- 13. No swimming or ice skating.
- 14. No hunting, firearms or trapping.
- 15. Horses are not permitted.
